Our Guest Speaker: Chris Nidagal

Some rarely seen epiphytic and terrestrial orchids of South India.

Chris will talk about his recent trip to India and the incredible orchids he saw and was able to photograph. Chris says "India has many orchid species but hardly any proper studies of them have been done. What was astounding for me was in two trips over 2 years, I saw something like 70 species, but nearly 30 to 35 species have not been seen or heard of outside the region they grow in India, let alone rest of the world. Yet, not too long in future, these may become extinct due to increased deforestation



and therefore loss of habitat. These are literally rarely seen plants indeed, as the title of the presentation proclaims, and does not include more prevalent and commonly known orchids that also grow there and elsewhere in India."

It is hard to imagine a more enthusiastic and passionate lover of orchids than Chris. Chris has been a member of Sydney Group since 2009, has been on the Sydney Group committee for many of these years, and also is an ANOS Judge. Chris is a member of a large number of orchid societies and is a regular at all the major orchid events around Sydney. Chris is keen on the cultivation of as many species as practical and keen on visiting and photographing orchids in their natural habitat. Chris grows a staggering array of orchids, and has a huge knowledge of many native and exotic orchid species and is always yearning to see, grow and learn more about orchids.

<u>Den. Macquarie Spectrum '#5' - June 2018 Plant of the</u> evening

The cross was done by Mike Harrison and a flask I acquired was planted out in 2001. It has been fairly slow to flower as the first plant only flowered in 2010 with '#5' flowering in 2017. It is grown cold under 50% shade cloth but with a solid cover all year 'round.

It is fertilised with Peters® CalMag finisher during the growing season.

The mix I use is my standard 4 to 1 medium bark with gravel (about 10 to 15 mm).

Watering is about every two weeks in winter and roughly every five to seven days in summer. This will vary depending on the weather conditions. As the cross came from Macquarie Orchid Nursery it was named last year as *Den*. Macquarie Spectrum. Spectrum since all the seedlings that flowered varied widely in colour.

Some Comments on the History of ANOS Sydney Group By David Butler with additional information from Graeme Russell

Over the years Sydney Group and its members have been active in putting on displays consisting exclusively of Australian Native orchids and foliage. Here are photos of three displays which I was involved in producing.

In 1986 the Orchid Society of NSW held an orchid show in the Sydney Town Hall and Bernie Fletcher and I contributed a native display. The native displays were to be located along the back wall of the stage area but fortunately they ran out of space and our display became an island in the centre of the main hall where the natives caught the eye and created great interest (Display 1).

In 1988 the Orchid Society of NSW held an orchid show in a large marquee in Sydney Domain as part of Bicentennial Celebrations. Members of Sydney Group contributed a very showy display of native epiphytes and terrestrials. A huge bowl of *Den. kingianum* 'Betty' provided by Sid Batchelor was positioned right in the front. We were surprised to see just how much interest the *kingianum* created, especially from overseas visitors (Display 2).

In 1990 an ANOS Conference was held in Wollongong and four of us, Bernie Fletcher, Norm Biffin, Sid Batchelor and I contributed a large floor display which received the first prize for displays. In the light of apparent global warming, the date of the show is of interest (Display 3). It was held in the last week of September. The late date suited both the local epiphytes and the terrestrials, many of which were brought up by Victorians. *Our local natives flowered very late in 1990 compared with flowering times in every year since*.

In the early '90s we did not have access to the types (and quality) of the natives people take for granted these days.

It may be worth noting that the only *D. speciosums* we had were var. *speciosum* (the local form) and var *hillii*. The var. *curvicaules*, *grandiflorums*, etc. had not yet arrived on the scene (they were only collected in the late '80s and not available generally for a few years). There were few hot/cold Dens, and few also of the showy yellow hybrids so widely grown today. Sarcochilus development was in its infancy and Sarcs didn't start flowering until October (the shows and displays were in September). We were proud of our natives and would never have imagined the advances which were about to take place.

David, Bernie and some friends presented a joint display of native and exotic orchids at Sydney Botanic Gardens as part of the OSNSW Spring Show 1993. The lower left picture is the section of grouped natives. The lower right picture is the overall display. Of significance to native growers is this was the first time Bernie's champion Dendrobium Yondi Tina 'Goliath' was exhibited. It later became the first plant to receive an ANOS First Class Certificate (FCC/ANOS). — Graeme Russell





In My Bush House By Bill Dobson – ANOS Sydney & Warringah Group

After my initial thoughts that this would be a poor season for our Aussie natives it appears that this may not necessarily be so as more and more 'spikes' appear to be showing. This appears to be at least 2-4 weeks later than would normally be the case. Whether the flowering time will work for our spring show remains to be seen.

After spraying for aphids they appear to be gone. Hopefully no more now till spring. One can't get rid of them permanently as they just fly through the shade cloth; so you have to be vigilant.

Now something I have been looking at over the last decade is mounts and pots. For years I used tree fern mounts in hard and soft with very limited success So apart for a couple of plants left I have discontinued use of this. It may suit some growers but not me and my conditions. Cork is another that I use in limited quantities. It is long lasting and a great many genera can be grown on it. It doesn't seem to get any bugs and is easy to shape. The best way to use it we have found is to cut the hard, inner layer of the bark and use this face (the opposite of what you would normally think). Also I round the edges to make it easier for the roots to wind themselves around. Further it can be used as a raft (horizontal) or a mount (vertical) as the occasion and plant dictates.

The next thing I have been using for over 10 years is 16-20mm wooden doweling (Bunnings) particularly in Cyprus Pine as this seems to deter insects. I have found that *Plectorrhiza tridentata* in particular loves this as does *Sarcochilus falcatus*. Do not cut it too short as you will need about 50cm which will give plenty of room for the roots to run up down and around. You could use cedar but is difficult to obtain and expensive. The doweling does work well and I have numerous plants that are specimen size.

The plants can be initially tied on with fishing line, stapled and even glued with hot melt as they all seem to work as is akin to how they are in the wild.

The thing that did surprise me is the use of Port Pots 80mm mesh pots for growing *Sarcochilus falcatus*. The root growth using these is staggering as I use just medium bark and just pop the plant in. Plants that were growing, just, on cork or hardwood are now thriving in these pots. They don't dry out as they do mounted but do not stay wet either. I just add some blood and bone and a little slow release fertiliser when potting up which would be impossible when mounting, so this may be an advantage. Anyway just my observations may be good for you.

Another plant that surprised me to pot up was *Dendrobium aemulum*. Sometimes this would struggle on a mount but in a pot it just races away. Perhaps again with some fertilizer blood and bone added and the bark just keeps some moisture around the roots without being wet. These look 100% better than the ones that are mounted.

Out And About (Tall Tales but Very True) By Mark 'Bush Basher' Daniels

My New Orchid Bush House

In the bush, orchids don't have too much help and they adjust well, but letting the orchids tough it out is not for me. I believe that simple thermo basics and the right conditions (moisture, humidity, air circulation, light, etc.) are important.

Winter blues are upon us and I just completed the new orchid house before the first frost. My orchids were doing it tough under the old Rosewood tree. It's taken most of my life as a hobby breeder to get to this point, where I now have a professional housing environment for my orchids. Built many an orchid house for everybody else, so now it's my turn.



This house is a non-structural design which is more favourable with council regulations and bypasses the need for a DA if used for a hobbyist orchid grower in residential areas. Check your zoning before building something like this, because mine being in a rural area is farming and horticulture. It's cheap but very strong. My last prototype lasted 35 years until I had to move last September.

There is no mechanisation here; one third is covered with clear Solar Weave on top of 50 percent white shade cloth for Hots, Cym' Canics' and Hot/Cold orchids. It measures (L) 26 meters x (W) 4.2 meters x (H) 3.0m.

The only addition will be an extra 30 percent white shade cloth sown into one large 8 meter x 26 meter sheet, to be applied in peak heat in summer over the whole structure. The thermo breeze way is formed by keeping both ends and part of the roof open. The odd fan will be used at flowering time.





My orchids are responding already with the well lighted conditions 200 to 400 candle lights.







Forgot to tell you all, if you want to build this, allow about \$3,000.00 give or take \$500 for materials and how good you are at hunting down cheap weld mesh for the benches. Mine was old galvanized fencing from schools. Allow 7 days labour for one man or two weekends for 2 men.
